# **Biographical Summary**

#### Academic

**Dr. Tukufu Zuberi** is the Lasry Family Professor of Race Relations, and Professor of Sociology and Africana Studies at the University of Pennsylvania. He has been a visiting professor at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda; the University of Dar es Salaam in Tanzania; in 2014 he held the Chair of the Institute for Advanced Interdisciplinary Studies, Federal University of Minas Gerais (UFMG), in Belo Horizonte, MG, Brazil; and in 2016 he served as the Distinguished Visiting Professor for CAPES program at the University of Brasilia and the Federal University of Bahia.

# Museums

Professor Tukufu Zuberi' museum projects have consisted of building collections for exhibitions, curating the redesign of exhibitions, and the refinement of visual narratives about Black bodies. He curated and collaborated in the design of Tides of Freedom: African Presence on the Delaware at the Independence Seaport Museum which premiered in May 2013 (click link here). He produced and directed five interstitials for inclusion in the Tides of Freedom gallery. His exhibition, Black Bodies in Propaganda: The Art of the War Poster premiered at the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology June 2013. The Black Bodies in Propaganda exhibit was also presented at the Northwest African American Museum in Seattle, Washington (2016), and at the Thomas Gilcrease Institute of American History and Art, Tulsa, Oklahoma (2017). Black Bodies in Propaganda presented 33 posters from Dr. Zuberi's private collection. He curated the redesign of Penn Museum's AFRICA GALLERIES: from MAKER TO MUSEUM opened in 29 November 2019 (click link here for a description). He directed ten interstitials for inclusion in the From Maker to Museum gallery (to see related videos click <a href="here">here</a>). He curated Fighting for Freedom: Art, War, & Black Bodies. This exhibition will premiere at the Penn Museum in August of 2025; from the Penn Museum it will travel internationally.

## Tv & Documentaries

From 2003 to 2014, Dr. Zuberi was a host of the hit **Public Broadcasting System** (PBS) series *History Detectives*. In 2014, Dr. Zuberi returned as host and co-producer of the summer PBS series History Detectives: Special Investigations. After his experience at PBS, Professor Zuberi has been making independent documentaries to accompany his exhibitions and other creative expressions. His first documentary was on **African Independence** (click <a href="here">here</a>). His most recent short documentary on African material culture in museums is entitled **Decolonizing the Narrative: Africa Galleries from Maker to Museum** (click link <a href="here">here</a>), and another full length documentary on a part of West Africa before European colonization entitled **Before Things Fell Apart** (click link <a href="here">here</a>). The first in a series of 3 short documentaries, Africa Galleries from Maker to Museum, is a 33-minute exploration of the debates about Museums, Reparations; Restitution; and Race.
